Beatriz Cortez: Voids, Portals, and Moving Land

Program

In this lecture, 2022–2024 Borderlands Fellow Beatriz Cortez charts the different ways in which her monumental sculpture *llopango*, the *Volcano that Left* counters ideas about permanence, portals, and multiple temporalities.

Currently on view at Storm King Art Center, the exhibition *Beatriz Cortez: The Volcano That Left* brings together new and recent large-scale sculptures by the El Salvador-born (1970), Los Angeles-based artist. Central to the exhibition is *llopango*, the Volcano that Left (2023), the speculative reconstruction of an ancient volcano that erupted in the sixth century C.E. in what is now El Salvador. Cortez considers the ash deposited by the eruption, an event known as Tierra Blanca Joven, as part of the sacred Mayan underworld. The artist imagines how the eruption's resulting migratory patterns reverberate across time, drawing connection to events such as the movement of the Maya or her own migration amid the Salvadoran Civil War in 1989, a catastrophe that displaced a million people. The volcano will be traveling up the Hudson River to EMPAC-Curtis R. Priem Experimental Media and Performing Arts Center at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute from October 27 through 29. For the Parsons Fine Arts Visiting Artist Lecture, the artist engages with the conceptual content carried by movement and impermanence. In particular, Cortez discusses her plans for the journey of her sculpture on the Hudson River, a voyage across water, land, time, and tides.

Artist Biography

Beatriz Cortez is a multidisciplinary artist based in Los Angeles and Davis, California. Her work explores simultaneity, life in different temporalities and versions of modernity, the untimely, and speculative imaginaries of the future. She has had numerous solo exhibitions and has participated in group exhibitions nationally and internationally. She has received numerous awards, including the Latinx Artist Fellowship (2023); California Studio Manetti Shrem Artist Residency at UC Davis (2022); Longenecker-Roth Artist Residency at UCSD (2021); Artadia Los Angeles Award (2020); Frieze LIFEWTR Inaugural Sculpture Prize (2019); Rema Hort Mann Foundation Emerging Artist Grant (2018); and California Community Foundation Fellowship for Visual Artists (2016), among others. Cortez holds an MFA from the California Institute of the Arts, and a doctorate from Arizona State University. She is faculty in the Studio Art Program at UC Davis.

Beatriz Cortez is a 2022–2024 Borderlands Fellow as part of the Vera List Center's Focus Theme cycle *Correction**.

About

Through these engagements, VAL facilitates a rigorous contemplation of each visiting artist's practice and the importance of their work to the field. The series exposes students to a range of approaches to the artists' lecture as they consider their own public presentations in the future.

The <u>Vera List Center for Art and Politics</u> is a non-profit research center at The New School in New York. Through its dynamic interdisciplinary programs, conferences, artist fellowships, residencies, publications, and exhibitions, and publications, the VLC imagines and supports new forms of politically engaged art, research, public scholarship, and community around the world.

The 2022–2024 Vera List Center Focus Theme *Correction** and the programs, fellowship projects, publications, and exhibitions dedicated to it explore the tension, discomfort, potential, and sociopolitical implications of "correction."

Vera List Center Fellowships support the development and presentation of ambitious art and research projects by national and international emerging artists, writers, scholars, and activists. Since 1994, the VLC Fellowship program has supported outstanding individuals at key moments in their early- and mid-careers, especially those who are members of underrepresented communities in the art world and those who would otherwise struggle to find support because of the experimental, political, and/or research-intensive nature of their work.

The Borderlands Fellowship is a joint initiative of the Center for Imagination in the Borderlands (CIB) at Arizona State University and the Vera List Center for Art and Politics (VLC) at The New School. The Borderland Fellowships are biennial fellowships for two individual artists/scholars/thinkers that pair the distinct institutional resources of CIB in Tempe, Arizona, and the VLC in New York City in order to support research projects that help create communities across different geographical, cultural, and political landscapes engaging both sites. The fellowships focus on the relevance of place, thus seeking to support and apply an Indigenous lens to reflect on questions of borderlands.
