

# **Breaking Protocol**

At the height of the COVID pandemic, transdisciplinary artist Maria Hupfield embarked on a research project on the protocols of Indigenous performance—tracing Indigenous knowledge systems, land-preservation practices, and Native feminist scholarship to illuminate strategies for enacting refusal within anticolonial frameworks. In this vein, Hupfield convened "Coffee Break" sessions—a series of conversations held over Zoom in which she invited international Indigenous performance artists to discuss their work, who in turn invited other artists to join the next conversation. Deftly weaving written reflections, visual essays, poetry, short stories, and scores, *Breaking Protocol* builds on the Coffee Break conversations, honoring, in Hupfield's words, "a diversity of practice, a grounding in Indigenous knowledge, and collective approaches to demanding sovereignty and critical accountability."

# Participant Biographies

Maria Hupfield is the City of Toronto Inaugural ArtworxTO Legacy Artist in Residence (2022), and a Mellon Distinguished Fellow, Center for the Imagination in the Borderlands, Arizona State University. Her touring solo exhibition The One Who Keeps On Giving, a production by The Power Plant in partnership with Southern Alberta Art Gallery, Lethbridge, Galerie de l'UQAM, Montréal, Mount Saint Vincent University Art Gallery, Halifax, and the Canadian Cultural Centre, Paris, (2017–2018), and Nine Years Towards the Sun at the Heard Museum, Phoenix, (2019–2020) combined exhibition display strategies with live performances and featured her creations made in industrial felt. Additional art venues include: the New York Museum of Art and Design; BRIC House Gallery, Brooklyn NY; Bronx Museum, NY; Boston Museum of Fine Arts, NY; Site Santa Fe, New Mexico; New York Smithsonian Museum of the American Indian, NY; Art Gallery of Ontario; the National Gallery of Canada; Montreal Museum of Contemporary Art, Quebec; the Montreal Museum of Fine Arts, Quebec; NOMAM in Zurich; Office of Contemporary Art Norway; Galerie Hugues Charbonneau, Montreal Quebec; and Patel Brown, Toronto Ontario. She is a 2020–2022 inaugural Borderlands Fellow for her project "Breaking Protocol" at the Vera List Center for Art and Politics at The New School and the Center for the Imagination in the Borderlands at Arizona State University, and was awarded the Hnatyshyn Mid-career Award for Outstanding Achievement in Canada 2018. She is co-owner of Native Art Department International with her husband artist Jason Lujan and is a member of the Anishinaabek People belonging to Wasauksing First Nation in Ontario. She's currently an Assistant Professor in Indigenous Performance and Media Art, and a Canadian Research Chair in Transdisciplinary Indigenous Arts, at the University of Toronto Mississauga (UTM), Canada.

Thomas (T.) Jean Lax is a curator and writer specializing in Black art, queer study and performance. At the Museum of Modern Art, they organized the exhibition Just Above Midtown: Changing Spaces (2022) about the gallery, founded by Linda Goode Bryant in 1974 where "blackness existed in the presence of black folks rather than in the absence of whiteness." In 2019, Lax worked with colleagues across MoMA on a major rehang of its collection, celebrated as an "integrated presence of difference itself"; in 2018, Lax co-organized the exhibition Judson Dance Theater: The Work is Never Done with Ana Janevski and Martha Joseph, historicizing the emergence of postmodern dance in the early 1960s within avant-garde jazz, high camp, and eco-critical improvisations. Lax's other collaboratively-organized exhibitions include the Projects Series for emerging artists; Unfinished Conversations, inspired by the cultural theorist Stuart Hall; and the contemporary art survey exhibition, Greater New York. Previously, they worked at The Studio Museum in Harlem for seven years organizing When The Stars Begin To Fall: Imagination and the American South and participating in the landmark "f show" contemporary art series. Lax is a former board member of the Vera List Center for Art and Politics.

Since 1994, the VLC Fellowship program has supported outstanding individuals at key moments in their early- and mid-careers, especially those who are members of underrepresented communities in the art world and those who would otherwise struggle to find support because of the experimental, political, and/or research-intensive nature of their work.

The Borderlands Fellowship is a joint initiative of the Center for Imagination in the Borderlands (CIB) at Arizona State University and the Vera List Center for Art and Politics at The New School. They are awarded biennially to three individual artists/scholars/thinkers that pair the distinct institutional resources of the CIB in Tempe, Arizona, and the VLC in New York City in order to support research projects that help create communities across different geographical, cultural, and political landscapes engaging both sites. The fellowships focus on the relevance of place, thus seeking to support and apply an Indigenous lens to reflect on questions of borderlands.
